Required Reading:

5th Grade

All rising 5th Grade students will read *Hatchet* by Gary Paulsen.

*If needed, I have a limited number of copies I can provide prior to the summer.

6th Grade

All rising 6th Grade students will read *Among the Hidden* by Margaret Peterson Haddix.

*If needed, I have a limited number of copies I can provide prior to the summer.

Choice Book List

Please choose **ONE** book from this list **that you have not read before**. You may choose either fiction or nonfiction.

Fiction

Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone by J.K. Rowling (Harry Potter series)

Lexile: 880

Harry receives a letter on his 11th Birthday inviting him to Hogwarts, School of Witchcraft and Wizardry. Harry discovers he is not only a wizard but a famous one.

Stormbreaker by Anthony Horowitz (Alex Rider series)

Lexile: 670

They said his uncle Ian died in a car accident. But Alex Rider knows that's a lie, and the bullet holes in the windshield prove it. Yet he never suspected the truth: his uncle was really a spy for Britain's top secret intelligence agency. And now Alex has been recruited to find his uncle's killers...

Wonder by R.J. Palacio

Lexile: 790

Through the perspective of multiple narrators, R. J. Palacio shares the story of Auggie Pullman—a 10-year-old boy born with a genetic condition that causes facial differences—transitioning from a life of secluded homeschooling to the jarring experience of attending a mainstream elementary school for the first time. Primary themes of interest to middle school students: disability and difference, identity, bullying, coming of age, isolation and inclusion.

The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe by C.S. Lewis (Chronicles of Narnia series) Lexie: 940

Four adventurous siblings—Peter, Susan, Edmund, and Lucy Pevensie—step through a wardrobe door and into the land of Narnia, a land frozen in eternal winter and enslaved by the power of the White Witch. But when almost all hope is lost, the return of the Great Lion, Aslan, signals a great change . . . and a great sacrifice.

The Last Cuentista by Donna Barba Higuera

Lexile: 730

Relocating to a new planet after Earth is destroyed, 12-year-old Petra Peña's suspended animation fails during the 370-year journey, so when all the other children are mysteriously reprogrammed and the adults purged, Petra becomes the lone bringer of Earth's now forbidden stories and her grandmother's Mexican folklore to a changing humanity.

The Call of the Wild by Jack London (A classic and one of Mr. Schettler's favorites!) Lexile: 1120

The Call of the Wild tells the gripping tale of Buck, a domesticated dog who is thrust into the harsh and unforgiving world of the Alaskan wilderness during the Klondike Gold Rush. Throughout the novel, he faces trials of survival and encounters with both cruelty and kindness.

Around the World in 80 Days by Jules Verne (A classic and one of Mr. Schettler's favorites!) Lexile: 1090

This classic novel by Jules Verne, who is considered to be the father of the science fiction genre, chronicles the daring journey of Phileas Fogg, a wealthy Englishman who makes a wager that he can circumnavigate the globe in just eighty days. Accompanied by his loyal servant Passepartout, Fogg encounters various challenges and adventures, from navigating treacherous landscapes to escaping dangerous adversaries, all while racing against time.

Nonfiction

Amelia Lost: The Life and Disappearance of Amelia Earhart by Candace Fleming Lexile: 930

On May 21, 1937, the most famous female pilot of all time, Amelia Earhart, set out to do the impossible: circumnavigate the globe at its widest point–27,000 miles in all. Just six weeks later, she disappeared over the Pacific Ocean. Eighty years have passed since that fateful flight; and still, Amelia's plane has never been found. Discover the thrilling life and tragic end of America's most famous trailblazing flier with this impeccably researched and masterfully crafted book from acclaimed author Candace Fleming.

Chasing Lincoln's Killer by James L. Swanson

Lexile: 980

Based on rare archival material, obscure trial manuscripts, and interviews with relatives of the conspirators and the manhunters, *Chasing Lincoln's Killer* is a fast-paced thriller about the pursuit and capture of John Wilkes Booth: a wild twelve-day chase through the streets of Washington, D.C., across the swamps of Maryland, and into the forests of Virginia. This book, based on Swanson's adult bestseller, "Manhunt: The 12-Day Chase for Lincoln's Killer," is a true account for young readers about John Wilkes Booth's assassination of Abraham Lincoln, the 16th president of the United States.

Reaching for the Moon: The Autobiography of NASA Mathematician Katherine Johnson by Katherine Johnson

Lexile: 1040

The inspiring autobiography of NASA mathematician Katherine Johnson, who helped launch Apollo 11. Katherine Johnson's story was made famous in the bestselling book and Oscar-nominated film *Hidden Figures*. Now in *Reaching for the Moon* she tells her own story for the first time, in a lively autobiography that will inspire young readers everywhere.

Write at least 2-3 sentences per question to turn in. Also be prepared to discuss your book choice. The following questions are meant to help you analyze and summarize your book. - 1. What made you choose this book? Is it similar to other books you've read before?
- 2. From whose point of view is the story told, and how does this point of view shape the story?
